# DIVERSITY ACCEPTANCE

#### **Objectives:**

- Students will reflect on their own character and identify ways they could improve it.
- Student's will find similarities they have with their classmates as well as characteristics unique to them and be able to describe why it is important to find commonalities in others.

# **Recognize the Unrecognized**

Write a note of thanks and encouragement to someone in the school who you feel does not get recognized enough for what they do.

This could be a student, custodian, food service worker, secretary, teacher, principal, or even a parent volunteer.

### **ACTIVITY #1**

- Get into groups of four with everyone in the group having at least one letter in their first name that is the same. For example: John, Molly, Byron, Josh all have an 'o.'
- 2. Take out a piece of paper.
- Come up with a characteristic or quality that you all have in common using the shared letter. (Ex. 'Optimistic' or 'Overly Excited')
- 4. After your group has come up with a shared characteristic, you should individually complete an acrostic name poem by taking each letter of your first name and writing a characteristic, hobby, or favorite thing out of each letter of your name that represents yourself. That's what an acrostic poem is! Using each letter of a word to create a poem or story of some kind. See example on next page.

- **A -** Artistic
- **R** Reading
- **A** Apples
- H Happy
- Now share your acrostic poem with each member of your team.
- Next, write a summary statement regarding your four different name descriptions using the following prompts to help:

  - How are we different?
  - Was it hard or easy to find what we had in common?
  - What surprised us from what we learned about each other?
  - Why does it matter that we find things we have in common?
